The Challenge

Maine Advisory Committee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights

- "Living assistance is a particularly critical issue in Maine, as it is such an essential service and is, currently, so lacking within the state.
- There is very little we can offer women who are trying to escape . . . except maybe a hotel room for a few nights,"
- "[There] are virtually no programs long-term for people . . . [there] is not an appropriate residential program to deal with . . . [sex trafficking] in the state of Maine"





The Need:

The Safe House

- Stable, short term and safe housing;
- Easy access to the courts;
- Advocacy services to support victims in understanding the choices and options available to them and to navigate systems in order to secure their rights and safety;
- Crisis intervention, case management services; and
- Access to treatment, social supports and community services

The Process

- Identifying the right house
 - Location
 - Size
 - Condition
 - Security
- Repairing the property
- Securing local acceptance
- Contracting with a community service provider



Service Component

- Building security and accessibility
- Staffing
 - 24 hours/day; 7 days/week
- Staff training
 - Victim centered
 - Trauma informed
 - Issues unique to sex trafficking
 - Cultural and language barriers
- Development of a residential treatment program
