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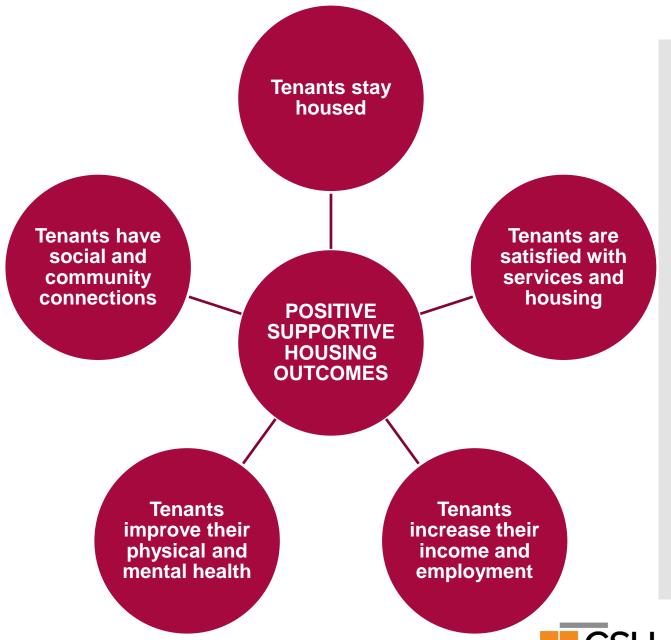

Integrated

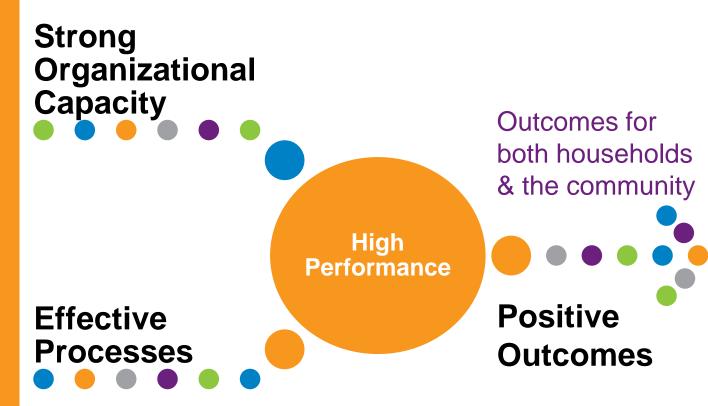

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Increasing Quality in Supportive Housing through Policy

- Integrate dimensions of quality into Qualified Allocation Plans
- Ensure that RFPs for housing finance opportunity include quality requirements
- 3 Advocate that funding / legislative action on supportive housing requires dimensions of quality
- Adopt dimensions of quality throughout pipeline planning, development, and sustainability



Understand the Need

- Develop a Housing Taskforce that is responsible for identifying solutions, aligning resources throughout the state, and promoting best practices
- Bring together core state agencies, such as Housing, Health and Human Services, Child Welfare, Corrections, Economic Development, Education, and Finance with stakeholder and people with lived experience
- Acknowledge and address the history of racism in housing policy and address implicit biases in budgetary, programmatic, and policy decisions.
- Link administrative and program level data to conduct a thorough needs assessment

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Prioritize Supportive Housing Allocations

- Designate units/allocations specifically for supportive housing within low-income developments
- Ensure accessible service enrichments and request a social service plan that outlines the intended services, description of source funding, length of funding, and evidence of sustainable funding beyond the current timeline.

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Layer Housing & Service Funding Sources

- Coordinate resources for capital, operating, and services
- Look to federal, state, local, and private dollars
- Streamline resources across state agencies – PHAs, child welfare, corrections, etc
- Streamline financial resources
 - housing bonds, tax revenues, social impact bonds, Opportunity Zone Funds,



Use Data to Track Progress and Outcomes

- Project the number of supportive housing units expected to be developed and report annually on how many units were actualized
- Set clear expected outcomes and review data annually to understand progress
- Identify key performance indicators and track outcomes based on the goals set forth and agreed upon by partners and stakeholder

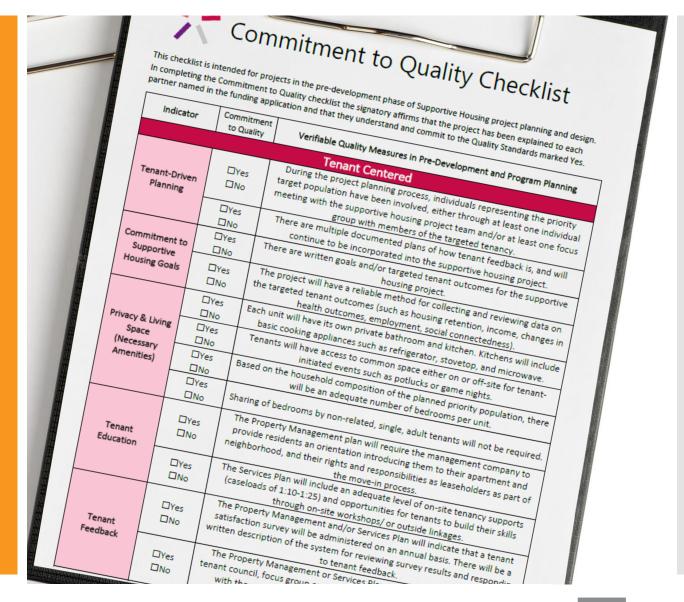

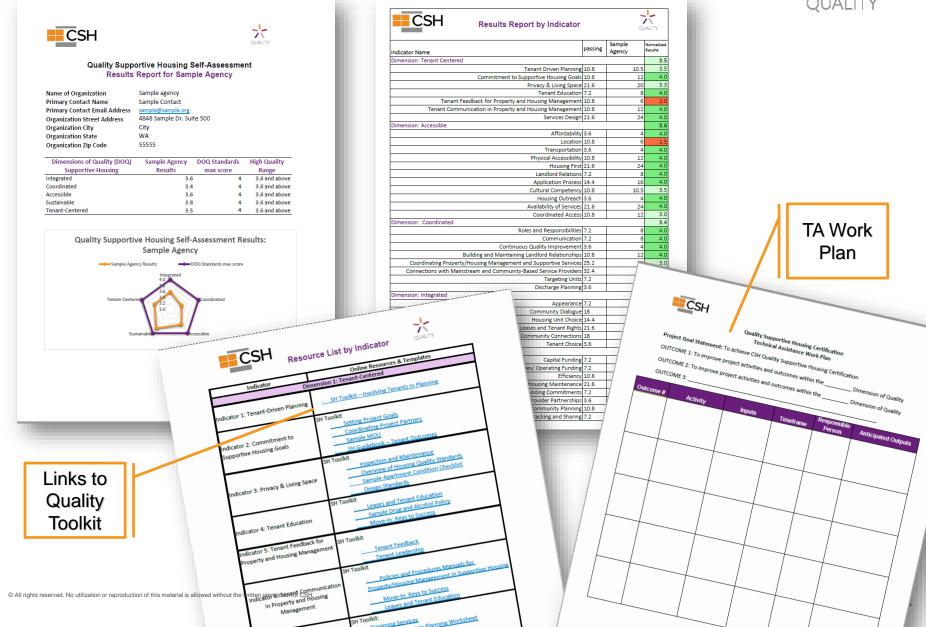

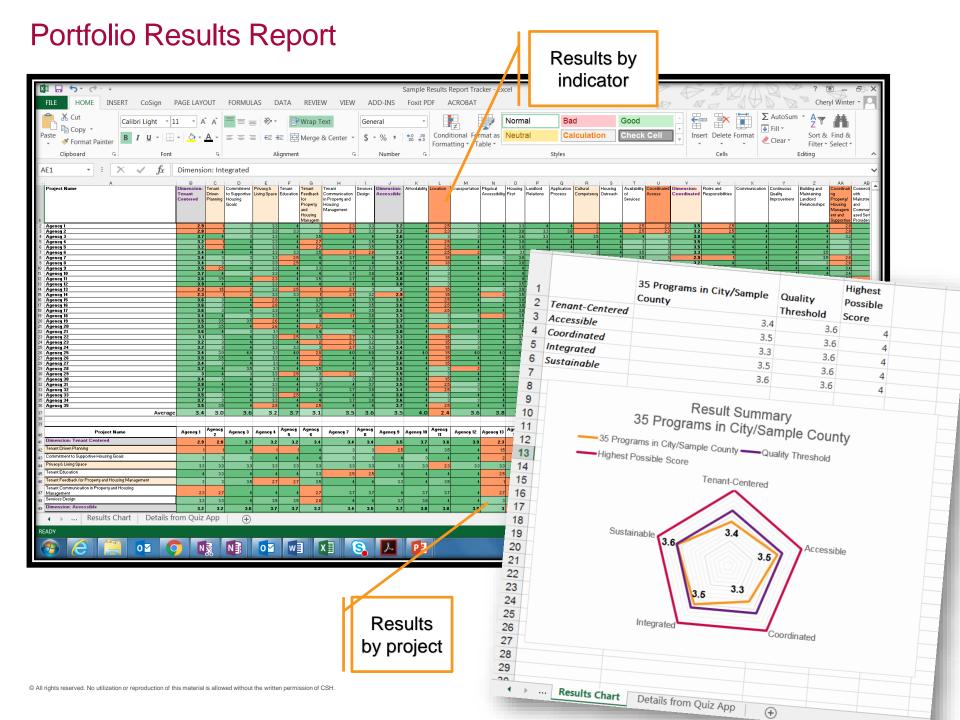
